2:30 **Peace and Reunion at Gettysburg**—Discover the story of the Peace Portico, the structure on the west side of the building that was the first monument to peace on the Gettysburg Battlefield. Learn how the structure commemorates peace, reunion, and reconciliation. 20 minutes. Meet near the elevator on the 2nd floor.
